Purpose of Report:	An application has been received for a variation to the exisiting Premises Licence No. OWPMA0050 for Beaumont House, University of Leicester Halls of Residence, Stoughton Drive South, Oadby, Leicester LE2 2NA in relation to the University of Leicester's Botanic Gardens. The Sub-Committee is asked to determine whether the variation to the licence is to be granted in respect of the application submitted.
Report Summary:	An application has been made for a variation to the premises licence to allow licensable activities to be extended, including outdoors and indoors. Objections have been raised from nearby residents. The applicant held meetings with the residents and a representative of the responsible authorities, an Environmental Health Officer, who submitted a Notification of Agreement dated 26 September 2023 under the Licensing Act 2003 which was agreed and signed by the applicant. The Notification of Agreement has been presented to the objectors of the initial variation application who still wish to object.
Recommendation(s):	To determine whether the variation to the premises licence is to be granted or refused. If the application is to be granted, the Sub-Committee is asked to determine whether the application is to be granted as requested or, if not, what hours and regulated activities are granted and what additional conditions (if any) are to be attached.

## 1. Application/Representations Received

1.1 The application as submitted, advertised and circulated to the responsible authorities, is for the following regulated activities.

1.2. The application is to propose both on and off licensable activities, when events take place at the 2 locations specified in the application, being Beaumont House at the University of Leicester Halls of Residence and University of Leicester Botanical Gardens, as follows:

All licensable activities to be on and off premises	Monday to Sunday
Performance of dance, plays and live music, provision of anything of a similar description to live music, recorded music, or performances of dance, exhibition of a film, recorded music	From 11:00 hrs to 00:00 hrs
Late night refreshment	From 23:00 hrs to 00:00 hrs
Sale of alcohol	From 11:00 hrs to 23:30 hrs

- 1.2 A copy of exisiting premises licence can be found at **Appendix 1.**
- 1.3 A copy of the full variation application can be found at **Appendix 2.**
- 1.4 A copy of the premises plan can be found at **Appendix 3.**
- 1.5 All of the required advertising and notifications have been undertaken. No representations have been received from the responsible authorities.
- 1.6 Representations have been received from 17 persons relating to the application, all of whom live in adjacent residential properties. Copies of these representations can been found at **Appendix 4.**

## 2. Objections

- 2.1 As a result of the objections having been received, the Environmental Health Officer visited the location and spoke to the applicant and their agent in order to assess the likely impact of the activities requested on the neighbourhood.
- 2.2 Having assessed the likely impact, proposed amendments to the application resulted in the completion of Notification of Agreement dated 26 September 2023 limiting the activities and agreeing the location of the outside activities with the intent of reducing any adverse impacts should the variation be granted.
- 2.2. A copy of the Notification of Agreement can be found at **Appendix 5** and a revised premises plan at **Appendix 6**. These were shared subsequently with the objectors.
- 2.3. In light of the continued objections, a remote meeting was held on 10 November 2023 with the objectors, their legal representative, the applicant and their agent to discuss the proposed conditions set out in **Appendix 7** which would be acceptable to the objectors if Members were minded to grant the application.
- 2.4. The applicant and their agent have also held a public meeting with local residents who are not legally represented.

## 3. Determination of the Application

- 3.1 The Licensing Sub-Committee have responsibility to discharge the functions delegated to it as defined under Part 2 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 3.2 When considering and determining the variation application, the Sub- Committee,

is required by Section 3 of the Licensing Act 2003 to carry out is functions with a view to promoting the 4 Licensing objections which are:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance: and
- The protection of children from harm

In doing so, it should balance the views of both the applicant and any objectors in a balanced and proportionate way.

3.3 Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 also require the Licensing Authority to have regard to the relevant provisions of the guidance set out in Section 182 of the Act (Secretary of State's Guidance August 2023) and the Council's own Statement of Licensing Policy (2020-2025). Officers believe that the relevant sections include but are not limited to:


- 3.4 The Sub-Committee, may if it considers it to be in the public interest, or if it considers it necessary for further consideration of any representations made by a party, adjourn the hearing to a specified date or arrange for a hearing to be held on a specified additional dates (paragraphs 11 to 13 of the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005).
- 3.5 The Sub-Committee is reminded of its duty under the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to consider the crime and disorder implications of its decisions and the Licensing Authority's responsibility to co-operate in the reduction of crime and disorder in the Borough.
- 3.6 Section 52(3) of the Licensing Act 2003 sets out the Licensing Authority must give regard to the application and any relevant representations and takes such steps as it considers necessary, if any, for the promotion of the licensing objectives.
- 3.7 The steps which the Sub-Committee may consider necessary are:
  - To modify the conditions of the new licence
  - To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence
  - Refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor; and/or
  - Refuse the application.

## 4. Legal

4.1 Where a party to the decision is aggrieved with the decision they, have a right to appeal the decision of the Sub-committee to the Magistrates' Court.

## 5. Financial

5.1	There is a risk of costs arising from an appeal against the decision of the Sub-Committee. In order to mitigate the risk of a costs award against the Council, the Sub-Committee should give clear reasons for its decisions and any such reasons would should be capable of being substantiated on appeal.





## Annex 1 - Mandatory Conditions

1) Supply of alcohol

No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -

- a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3) Admission of children to the exhibition of any film must be in accordance with the recommendations of the British Board of Film Classification for that film.

Where permission has been given by the Licensing Authority to show a film not classified by the British Board of Film Classification, the requirements made by

the Licensing Authority for the admission of children to the exhibition of that film must be followed.



Mandatory Conditions under Section 19A of the Licensing Act 2003, as specified by The Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010 where Premises Licence Authorises Supply of Alcohol

- 1) The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises. In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children.
- (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to(i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the
  premises

before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to
  - a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Act);
  - (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase

consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;

(d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where that

provision is dependent on-

- (i) the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
- (ii) the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- (e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which

can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness

in any favourable manner.

2) The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another

(other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).

- 3) The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4) (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises

in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

(2) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as

may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph,

date of birth and a holographic mark.

5) The responsible person shall ensure that-

(a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold

or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the

following measures-

(i) beer or cider: ½ pint;

(ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and

(iii) still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and


(b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

the authority of the Secretary of State or an authorised mess of members of Her Majesty's naval, military or air forces:

- f) the taking of alcohol from the premises by a person residing there;
- g) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to any private friends of a person residing there who are bona fide

entertained by him at his own expense, or the consumption of alcohol by persons so supplied;

h) the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises to persons employed there for the purposes of the business carried on by

the holder of the licence, or the consumption of liquor so supplied, if the liquor is supplied at the expense of their employer

or of the person carrying on or in charge of the business on the premises.

i) Children (under the age of 16) must be accompanied by an adult when on the premises in accordance with Section 145 of the

Licensing Act 2003.

Annex 3 - Conditions attached after a hearing by the Licensing Authority

After a Licensing Hearing held on 4 March 2009, the Licensing Panel determined the following based on the 'the prevention of Crime & Disorder',

'Public Safety', 'the prevention of Public Nuisance', and the 'the protection of Children from Harm' under the Licensing Act 2003.

1. Licensable activities will only take place inside the building defined on the plan as approved by the Licensing Sub Panel at a

hearing on 4 March 2009. (See annex 4)

2. Windows and doors to the building are to be kept closed whenever Licensable Activities take place.

  - iv) The premises will be closed to the public at midnight.

- 5. The supply of alcohol and provision of entertainment will be restricted to:
  - i) persons resident in the hall
- ii) the bona fide guests of such persons
  - those attending courses or similar events at the hall in respect of which at least 80 percent of those attending them are resident in the hall
  - iv) members of the University as defined by its statutes, and
  - v) employees of the University

## NOTES TO THE LICENCE HOLDER

The Licensing Panel recommended that the following notes to the licence holder are to be included:-

The licence holder will:

- a. liaise with the Council's Environmental Health Department on good practice measures on noise control
- b. continue with the good practice of notifying residents of forthcoming events and to provide to residents a 365 day per year

c. host a liaison meeting with residents on no less than two occasions per year.





The University is an educational institution and is a responsible retailer, with numerous premises licenses across the estate. Staff and the organization have robust training procedures and policies to safeguard the public and children and avoid creating disorder or unrest

The university have a dedicated team of security staff. The security team provide static and mobile security across the university estate. This includes building and land, with additional security and safety services provided in the neighborhood. Robust internal and external CCTV is in place with a 24/7 monitoring room. The university may also use additional specialist teams to provide security and crown control. These include ShowSec

#### c) Public safety

The university operates a large estate with 20,000 students. Many of whom are residents in the city. There are robust processes and procedures in place to ensure the safety of staff, students and visitors to the university. Many members of the public attend events such as graduation, open days, student arrival weekends and the day to day operation of the organization. We also have very strong links to the relevant support agencies locally and nationally including the police and the local authority council

#### d) The prevention of public nuisance

The university is a 'good neighbor' and operates several sites (campuses) whilst ensuring that the any activity or behavior that could be considered a nuisance, is managed correctly. This includes the O2 Academy night club, the student residents bar at Oadby student village and several licensed premises across main campus. The University engages with the local neighborhood to positively ensure that any nuisance behavior or patterns or behavior that could lead to disturbance, are managed and removed. The university dedicated security team, provide a robust patrol service and interact with the neighborhood and local agencies to ensure the prevention of public nuisance. The licensed premises has a dedicated operational management team in place to oversee the daytime and nighttime operation of the spaces to ensure the licensing law is upheld.

#### e) The protection of children from harm

The university has a dedicated team to support minors and young people. There are welfare support mechanisms such as 'drink aware' residents life mentors, student union officers and services. All staff operating in licensed premises are trained in the process of serving alcohol and licensing law. Representation against an Application to Vary a Premises Licence submitted by University [sic] of Leicester – Leicester Services Partnership, 7/8/2023

Having read in full

- the University's Application to Vary a Premises Licence, dated 7<sup>th</sup> August 2023
- the existing Premises Licence for Beaumont House (Oadby & Wigston Borough Council Premises Licence ref. OWPMA0050, dated 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021)

my husband and I wish to make the following representations against the Application. We do so as close neighbours of the Botanical Gardens who will be significantly affected by any changes permitted in Beaumont House or the Botanical Gardens, but also as strong supporters of the University of Leicester, for whom I currently work as an honorary clinical lecturer.

Of the four Licensing Objectives listed in the Borough Council's *Statement of Licensing Policy 2020-2025*, our objections fall mainly into the area of Prevention of Public Nuisance. We are concerned that an extension to the Botanical Gardens of the current permissions relating to indoor activities at Beaumont House will be detrimental to local residents' peaceful enjoyment of their property and, more importantly, to the enjoyment that residents of Oadby, Wigston and further afield derive from the tranquillity of the Botanical Gardens and the surrounding area. We feel that, despite their claim in Section 16d of the Application to be a 'good neighbour [*sic*]', the University has not taken sufficient notice of the impact that their potential licence would have on the surrounding residential neighbourhood of Glebe Road, Glebe Close, Eynsford Close, Wilmington Court, Glebe Gardens, and Knighton Grange Road.

We are very much concerned about the following

**Noise**, both from the entertainments themselves and from the customers attending them. The proposed entertainments cover a very wide range of activities, with a wide range of performance styles and noise levels. We note that the Application does not include any details of anticipated noise levels, or even whether music is to be amplified or unamplified, in any of the categories of entertainment applied for, including the Provision of Live Music. Currently when there are events held at the Race course, or at the student accommodation the noise is so loud that we hear it inside our houses.

Traffic and Parking in Glebe Road and adjoining roads. At present, parking and traffic flows in Glebe Road are frequently very heavy, with consequent adverse effects both on the neighbourhood, and on public safety for pedestrians and car users. Extending the number of events held in the Botanical Gardens will only exacerbate these issues. People park on our drive during events held at botanical gardens, which are not many and don't go beyond the normal opening hours so we tend to tolerate them. Parking becomes a significant issue, if events are going to be held 7 days a week especially if they go on until midnight. This will also have an impact on privacy and safety. Added to that the rubbish and the litter that will be thrown on our grass within our boundaries, (being a corner house)

**Extent**: The Application is for a licence from 11.00am to midnight, 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. It is our firm opinion that such extraordinarily broad terms, if granted, would open up the Botanical Gardens and surrounding area to all kinds of potential public nuisance. Moreover, we note with considerable surprise that Section 15 of the Application lists these as being the hours that the premises are already open to the public, when in fact they represent a very significant extension to the Botanical Gardens' existing opening hours of 10.00am to 4.00pm (5.00pm during BST). We can't help wondering whether the members of the University's governing Council and Senate have been made aware of this proposed alteration.

We are also concerned at the **Cumulative impact** that the granting of the Application would have on the area surrounding the Botanical Gardens. As the Council's Environmental Health team may be aware, our neighbourhood already experiences significant noise disturbance several times a year from the Racecourse, sufficient to drive us from our gardens, and still very audible even within closed doors, when it holds public events with amplified music. This disturbance is compounded when, a few times a year, similar public events are held on Victoria Park, some 2 miles away from the neighbourhood of Glebe Road. The addition of the unlimited public events now being proposed for the Botanical Gardens will have a very significant cumulative impact, and we strongly urge the Licencing Authority to reject the Application, or at least to take steps to mitigate its adverse effects.

#### Actions that may be taken to remedy our concerns

To meet the concerns that we have outlined above, we would like to suggest that the Licencing Authority might consider, amongst other things:

- a drastic curtailment of the number of hours per day, and of the total number of days a year, in which a licence would be allowed to operate. Other than in very limited cases, evening activities will be particularly problematic;
- 2. the imposition of strict noise controls, in the form of decibel limits and the routine use of noise limiters, to ensure that noise levels in surrounding residential properties are kept within acceptable limits. We note with interest that the existing licence for Beaumont House stipulates (Annex 3.2) that 'windows and doors to the building are to be kept closed whenever Licensable Activities take place': this will clearly not be possible in the Botanical Gardens;
- 3. the imposition of evening parking restrictions in Glebe Road and surrounding roads, to prevent noise, disturbance and anti-social behaviour from people arriving at or leaving the premises affecting the local residential area;
- 4. alcohol sales to be restricted to those attending events in Beaumont House and the Botanical Gardens (see restrictions imposed in Annex 3.5 of the existing licence);
- 5. the University to be required (as in the Notes to the Licence Holder at the end of the existing licence) to liaise with the Council's Environmental Health Department on good practice measures on noise control;

- 6. similarly, the University to notify local residents of forthcoming events, and to provide local residents with a 365-days-a-year callout telephone number;
- 7. similarly, the University to host a liaison meeting with local residents on no fewer than two occasions per year.
- 8. Our final suggestion, is to hold these events at the college court instead, as it has all the required facilities, with ample parking and it stands away from houses and is on the main road which makes it less likely to impact on a quiet residential area

#### To Licensing Authority

We are writing as concern residents residing in close proximity to the Botanical Garden and Beaumont House. It is with great urgency that we express our objection to the recent application made by the University to extend their licensing permissions.

We are aware that the University has submitted an application to extend their licensing to include the sale of alcohol and the hosting of live music events on and off their premises from Monday to Sunday, with operational hours extending until midnight. This proposed extension deeply troubles us, as it threatens the quiet and tranquil environment that we consciously chose as our place of residence and retirement.

Living opposite the University grounds has allowed us to enjoy the peaceful ambiance that complements our daily lives. Granting such an extended license, however, has the potential to disrupt not only our peace but also our overall wellbeing in several significant ways.

First and foremost, we are concerned about the lack of accountability that may accompany this license extension. With the university's permission to host corporate events, weddings, and other gatherings, we are left questioning the logistics of accommodating the increased influx of vehicles and the potential strain on parking facilities. While parking may seem like a minor issue, it exacerbates the overall impact on our lives.

Moreover, the sale of alcohol until midnight poses a genuine concern. Experience has shown that late-night drinking often leads to disruptive and disrespectful behaviour by patrons who spill onto the streets and create disturbances. As responsible neighbours, we value our quietude, and this license extension would make it difficult for us to enjoy our homes when such disturbances occur from Monday to Sunday. We firmly believe that as residents, we have the right to rest and not to live under constant and prolonged stress due to noise pollution.

Furthermore, the university's proposal seems to lack an adequate plan to ensure the well-being of its own students who reside in this vicinity. Students require a conducive environment to study and rest, and the constant disruption caused by latenight noise and events may hinder their academic performance and overall quality of life.

Additionally, we are concerned that the University's shift towards a more corporate culture may detract from its primary educational mission. It is imperative that the council takes into consideration the balance between the university's commercial activities and its responsibility to provide a peaceful and suitable environment for both students and the neighbouring residents.

Over the upcoming weeks and months, we intend to monitor and document the noise levels in our neighbourhood. In the event that the council grants the proposed license extension to the University, we will be compelled to hold accountable, with

evidence, any irresponsible behaviour that negatively impacts our lives through excessive noise, anti-social conduct, and parking issues.

We kindly request that the council, in exercising its duty to protect our livelihoods and mental well-being, establishes stringent noise controls to mitigate the adverse effects of this licensing extension. While we understand the need to accommodate growth and development, we implore the council not to grant unrestricted permission for the sale of alcohol and live music, especially outdoors on the University grounds, as this would undoubtedly be detrimental to our health and well-being.

In closing, we trust that the council will give serious consideration to our concerns and objections and take measures to preserve the peaceful and tranquil atmosphere of our neighbourhood. We also trust that the council will prioritise our interests in line with its duty to uphold the well-being of its residents.

We are writing to formally lodge a strong objection to the proposed variation of the premises license application submitted by the University of Leicester – Leicester Services Partnership under the Licensing Act 2003. The applicant seeks to make significant changes to the licensable activities, including Performance of Dance, Plays, Live Music, Sale of Alcohol, and Late Night Refreshment, within the premises located at Percy Gee Building, Beaumont House, and University of Leicester Botanical Gardens.

While we acknowledge the valuable role that educational institutions like the University of Leicester play within our community and in our neighborhood, the changes to the premises license will adversely impact the wellbeing of ourselves as residents and community members in the surrounding areas.

#### **IMPACT STATEMENT**

Our objections are based on the following impact reasons:

**Noise and Disruption**: The proposed extension of licensable activities, particularly Live Music and Performance of Dance, until midnight, raises significant and real concerns about increased noise levels and potential disruptions in the vicinity. Studies consistently show that noise pollution beyond certain hours can have long-lasting health impacts on residents, including increased stress levels and reduced sleep quality. The noise pollution created by this Licence variation will have an extremely detrimental effect on our health, sleep patterns, and overall quality of life.

Impact on Residential Areas: Beaumont House is situated within a residential area. **Noise**, both from the entertainments themselves and from the customers attending them. The proposed entertainments cover a very wide range of activities, with a wide range of performance styles and noise levels. We note that the Application does not include any details of anticipated noise levels, or even whether music is to be amplified or unamplified, in any of the categories of entertainment applied for, including the Provision of Live Music.

**Traffic and Parking** in Glebe Road and adjoining roads. At present, parking and traffic flows in Glebe Road are frequently very heavy, with consequent adverse effects both on the neighbourhood, and on public safety for pedestrians and car users. Extending the number of events held in the Botanical Gardens will only exacerbate these issues.

**Extent**: The Application is for a licence from 11.00am to midnight, 7 days a week, 52 weeks a year. It is our firm opinion that such extraordinarily broad terms, if granted, would open up the Botanical Gardens and surrounding area to all kinds of potential public nuisance. Moreover, we note with considerable surprise that Section 15 of the Application lists these as being the hours that the premises are already open to the public, when in fact they represent a very significant extension to the Botanical Gardens' existing opening hours of 10.00am to 4.00pm (5.00pm during BST). We can't help wondering whether the members of the University's governing Council and Senate have been made aware of this proposed alteration.

We are also concerned at the **Cumulative impact** that the granting of the Application would have on the area surrounding the Botanical Gardens. As the Council's Environmental Health team may be aware, our neighbourhood already experiences significant noise disturbance several times a year from the Racecourse, sufficient to drive us from our gardens, and still very audible even within closed doors, when it holds public events with amplified music. This disturbance is compounded when, a few times a year, similar public events are held on Victoria Park, some 2 miles away from the neighbourhood of Glebe Road. The addition of the unlimited public events now being proposed for the Botanical Gardens will have a very significant cumulative impact, and we strongly urge the Licencing Authority to reject the Application, or at least to take steps to mitigate its adverse effects.

#### Actions that may be taken to remedy our concerns

To meet the concerns that we have outlined above, we would like to suggest that the Licencing Authority might consider, amongst other things:

- a drastic curtailment of the number of hours per day, and of the total number of days a year, in which a licence would be allowed to operate. Other than in very limited cases, evening activities will be particularly problematic;
- 2. the imposition of strict noise controls, in the form of decibel limits and the routine use of noise limiters, to ensure that noise levels in surrounding residential properties are kept within acceptable limits. We note with interest that the existing licence for Beaumont House stipulates (Annex 3.2) that 'windows and doors to the building are to be kept closed whenever Licensable Activities take place': this will clearly not be possible in the Botanical Gardens;
- the imposition of evening parking restrictions in Glebe Road and surrounding roads, to prevent noise, disturbance and anti-social behaviour from people arriving at or leaving the premises affecting the local residential area;
- 4. alcohol sales to be restricted to those attending events in Beaumont House and the Botanical Gardens (see restrictions imposed in Annex 3.5 of the existing licence);
- 5. the University to be required (as in the Notes to the Licence Holder at the end of the existing licence) to liaise with the Council's Environmental Health Department on good practice measures on noise control;
- 6. similarly, the University to notify local residents of forthcoming events, and to provide local residents with a 365-days-a-year callout telephone number;
- 7. similarly, the University to host a liaison meeting with local residents on no fewer than two occasions per year.

We, Brian Berry and Antonella Berry Brincat, residents at No.5, Glebe Road, Oadby, Leicester LE2 2LD, consider the variation of the terms of the existing licence would undermine all four licencing objectives.

We are writing to formally submit our representation and objection to the proposed variation of the premises license application submitted by the University of Leicester – Leicester Services Partnership under the Licensing Act 2003. The applicant seeks to make significant changes to the licensable activities, including Performance of Dance, Plays, Live Music, Sale of Alcohol, and Late Night Refreshment, within the premises located at Beaumont House, and University of Leicester Botanical Gardens.

We acknowledge the valuable role that educational institutions like the University of Leicester play within our community and in our neighbourhood, however the proposed changes to the premises license will adversely undermine the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder; public safety; the prevention of public nuisance; and the protection of children from harm.

Our representations are based on the following reasons:

#### Prevention of crime and disorder

The proposal to extend Alcohol Sales until 11:00 pm will undoubtedly cause a surge in alcohol-related problems among both students and patrons frequenting the licensed establishment. Well-established data unequivocally links extended alcohol service hours to a rise in anti-social conduct, crime, public disturbances, and alcohol-induced accidents. By endorsing these extended hours, we risk overburdening security and local law enforcement, straining already limited resources.

As an example, the city of Brighton and Hove implemented an "Early Morning Restriction Order" (EMRO) to tackle the negative impact of extended alcohol service hours on public order, safety, and quality of life. The report by Brighton & Hove City Council highlighted that crime increased in areas with extended hours, with alcohol-related violence being a significant concern.

Camden also experienced an increase in crime and public disorder due to extended alcohol service hours and a vibrant nightlife. The borough took measures to address the situation. According to the study by the Institute of Alcohol Studies, the London Borough of Camden saw a 44% increase in violent crime from 2005 to 2010, partly attributed to extended licensing hours.

#### **Public safety**

Beaumont House is situated within a residential area and Conservation Area. Beaumont House's proposed extension of Late Night Refreshment and Alcohol Sales hours is nothing short of an invitation to daytime and nocturnal chaos. Extending the hours for Late Night Refreshment and Sale of Alcohol in this location will lead to late-night revellers, resulting in disturbances, littering, anti-social behaviour and will surely compromise public safety and tranquillity of the local community.

The envisioned influx of patrons during the day and night threatens to sow the seeds of antisocial behaviour and littering, and above all will compromise public safety. The tranquillity and safety of our community is at stake, and public safety hangs in the balance.

Our community is already blighted with visitors who frequently come after sunset to partake in what seems recreational drink and drunks on Glebe Road. The proposed variation in licence will make matters worse.

#### The prevention of public nuisance

The proposed extension of licensable activities, particularly Live Music and Performance of Dance, until midnight, raises significant and real concerns about increased noise levels and potential public disruptions for us residents.

This proposition sparked significant concern among the neighbours. There is a great alarm and feeling of disbelief at the total disregard the University of Leicester has for its resident neighbours and also for its students residing in the halls of residence in applying for variation of its licence in its quest to generate income. As residents we have an unabating sense of alarm regarding the meteoric surge in noise levels that will inevitably reverberate through the heart of our neighbourhood, day in day out 7 days a week from 11.00am to 00.00 midnight.

Furthermore, studies consistently show that noise pollution beyond certain hours can have long-lasting health impacts on residents, including increased stress levels and reduced sleep quality. The noise pollution created by this Licence variation will have an extremely detrimental effect on our well-being, health, sleep patterns, and overall quality of life.

A study conducted by Imperial College London and King's College London assessed the health impact of noise pollution, including that from extended nightlife activities. The study found that long-term exposure to noise pollution is associated with an increased risk of heart disease and stroke. Source: Imperial College London - Noise Pollution Increases Risk of Heart Disease.

The proposed license variation could set a precedent for other establishments seeking similar extensions. The Licensing Authority must carefully consider the balance between the interests of the applicant on one hand and the prevention of public nuisance and well-being of the local community on the other consisting of a quiet residential neighbourhood.

It is not a mere matter of tolerating inconvenience; it is the erosion of our fundamental right to reside in an environment that respects our well-being and health.

#### The protection of children from harm

The University of Leicester Botanical Gardens are intended to serve as a serene and educational setting for the general public but especially for school children and other pupils. Allowing performances of Live Music and serving of alcohol in this tranquil area will disrupt its primary purpose and negatively affect the experience of those seeking tranquillity and solace.

We are duty-bound to shield the sanctity of these spaces, preserving their essence for the younger generation seeking learning opportunities, serenity and respite. We urge you to consider similar cases where extended licensable activities have led to community discord and negative outcomes negatively impacting on the licensing objectives.

In conclusion, we strongly oppose the proposed variation of the premises license for the University of Leicester – Leicester Services Partnership. It is imperative that the Licensing Authority carefully weighs the potential negative consequences against any perceived benefits before granting such a significant and negatively impactful change.

We kindly request that you consider our representations and reject the application to protect the rights, safety, and quality of life of the community members. Thank you.



Ahead of the scheduled meetings for tomorrow and Saturday, we thought it would be helpful to set out the amendments my clients are seeking to the application. The conditions below are aimed at addressing the potential impact of increased crime and disorder and public nuisance that the application as currently drafted could cause.

#### **Proposed Conditions**

- Outdoor events will be limited to one per calendar month with events not taking place on more than three consecutive days and only consecutive if it is a cultural event e.g. a theatre performance
- 2. Outdoor events shall only be permitted on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays (but not Sunday evenings) with no outdoor events to take place Monday Thursday.
- 3. All outdoor events will cease at 20:00 with Garden Gates locked at 21:00
- 4. The maximum numbers for any outdoor event shall not exceed 500
- 5. A Noise Management Plan (NMP) shall be agreed with the Environmental Health Officer prior to any event taking place. The NMP will include details and location of all noise monitoring equipment and records to be maintained.
- 6. A Noise Limiting Device will be utilised to ensure that amplified music does not exceed the prevailing background level plus 5dB at any noise sensitive property.
- 7. A full Traffic Management Plan (TMP) will be submitted to the Licensing Authority prior to any outdoor event taking place. This will include details of the location of Traffic Marshalls and to ensure that car parking is provided on site or by utilising other University provision.
- 8. The University will host at least 2 liaison meetings per year with residents
- 9. The University will notify local residents on Glebe Road LE2 2LD, Glebe Close LE2 2LD, Eynsford Close LE2 2LN, Wilmington Court LE2 2LD, Glebe Gardens LE2 2LQ, Knighton Grange Road LE2 2LF of forthcoming events at least 28 days in advance
- 10. The University will provide residents with a 24 hour 365 day per year call out telephone number.

We will elaborate more particularly on the NMP (5) and TMP (7) parking concerns at our meeting.

The application is seeking to permit all authorised licensable outdoors seven days a week with the same terminal hour as currently stated for indoor activity, this is a cause of great concern to my clients given the existing level of disturbance.

Although we have no indication of the events proposed we have assumed at this stage that it is not intended to host live music events seven days a week. However I am sure you will appreciate that the wide ranging nature of the application offers no assurance that this wont be the case. From initial discussions with the Licensing Officer, I understand that the intention is to host outdoor theatre style events and it would be helpful if this could be clarified.

My clients are genuine in their intentions to move towards an agreed position and we look forward to tomorrow's meeting which we hope will be a constructive one.
