**Matter for Decision** 

Title: Armed Forces Covenant

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## 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The armed forces covenant sets out the relationship between the nation, the state and the armed forces. It recognises that the whole nation has a moral obligation to members of the armed forces and their families and it establishes how they should expect to be treated.
- **1.2** At its meeting on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2013 the Council resolved:
  - i) That the Council agrees to sign the Armed Forces Covenant.
  - ii) That the detailed commitments as they would apply to Oadby & Wigston Borough Council will need to be worked up and agreed by members for inclusion in, and prior to the actual signing of the Covenant in 2014.
- **1.3** As a result of this a cross party members working group was set up, chaired by Councillor Lynda Eaton, to develop the detailed commitments working with Colonel Pope who is the main military liaison officer for the region.

## 2. Recommendations

- **2.1.** That the Council formally adopts the Oadby & Wigston Armed Forces Covenant as developed by the Working Group and agreed with Colonel Pope as attached in Appendix 1
- **2.2.** That the Working Group leads the implementation, development and evolution or the Covenant and reports back to the wider membership annually on progress.
- **2.3.** That a formal Civic signing event is organised and that the appropriate contributors are invited.
